All of the above programs are supported by your membership in GFWC and the General Federation of Women's Clubs continues to look for organizations that fit with the ideals and concepts that involve support of women and children's issues.

The Florida Federation of Women's Clubs was formed in 1895 and joined GFWC the same year. Those early clubs were the source of pride as we celebrated 120 years of Community Service in 2015. From the book [Leading the Way: A Century of Service](#), by Jessie Hamm Meyer, the following is written:

***"Clubs organized before 1900 were mostly in towns along waterways or railroads, but even in these towns and villages the approaches to club work were as varied as the towns. When the Village Improvement Association of Green Cove Springs invited clubs to meet for the purpose of uniting into a federation, delegates came from Crescent City, Tarpon Springs, Fairfield of Jacksonville and Orange City. The meeting was held on the 21st day of February, 1895, in Green Cove Springs.***

***The committee for planning a federation was Mrs. E. N. Burrows, Mrs. E. V. Low and Mrs. E. G. Munsell, all of Green Cove Springs. These women had planned the meeting well and a constitution and bylaws were adopted by the delegates, Mrs. S. B. Safford of Tarpon Springs; Mrs. Emma C. Tebbetts, Crescent City; Mrs. T. L. Morse, Orange City; Mrs. L. E. Wamboldt, Fairfield; Mrs. E. A. Graves, Green Cove Springs."***

Also during the 120 year membership of GFWC Florida in the General Federation of Women's Clubs, your members were part of history making events in your community and nationally such as:

- 1898 - Child labor laws established
- 1900 - Traveling libraries established – 75% of all libraries credited to Woman's Clubs
- 1904 - The Pure Food and Drug Act
- 1916 - National Park Service created
- 1920 - Everglades National Park formed
- 1920 - Nineteenth Amendment – Right to Vote
- 1930 - Opening of Yellowstone National Park
- 1944 - Equal Rights Amendment
- 1961 - Establishment of Seat Belt laws
- 1966 - Juniorette Clubs established
- 1978 - HOBY was organized
- 1990's - American's with Disabilities Act, Family Medical Leave, Handgun Control, Libraries expanded
- 2004 - Fire Truck purchased for NYC

Fire Department, replacing equipment lost as a result of the events of 9/11/2001

2008 - Bipartisan Pay Equality Bill

2015 - Expansion of the Domestic Violence Awareness and Prevention Bill




